# Parents, Be the Teenager You Want to Have

Not unlike many parents of young children, I often think about my kids as teenagers. There will be passing moments where they seem far older than their true age and I can envision them as a teenager.

There are times where their negotiation tactics have outwitted my own, and I remind myself that's only going to happen more frequently as time passes. I also use my children as future teenagers as a sort of parenting gauge.

I think about what I would like for my children as teenagers. I would like them to be kind, honest, fair, respectful people. Therefore, I have to be a kind, honest, fair and respectful person right now.

There is no greater motivation for being the person you want to be than being a parent. This, of course, relates to my own screen time usage. My children do not have digital devices now, but, in the future, they will. Therefore, I use mine in a way that I would like my children to use theirs: I do not bring it to the dinner table, I never have it when socializing, I don't use it while driving etcetera. In short, I try to model good use.

New research shows that this is critically important, not just to model for your future teenagers but to encourage positive behavior in your "right-now" children.

#### The Parental Phone Habit

It seems like all of us are struggling with digital boundaries in some form or another. However, others are struggling a bit more. The American Psychological Associations recent Stress in America survey called them "constant checkers" and found they were more likely to experience higher stress.

The same survey found that almost half of parents don't feel connected to their children, even when they are together due to the influence of technology. Problematic digital use affects parental stress levels and research suggests it also may affect their children's behavior.

#### What the Research Tells Us About the Impact of Our Habit

There was an observational study several years ago which highlighted the problem. Dr. Jenny Radesky and colleagues from the Boston Medical Center conducted observations of 55 families at restaurants around the Boston area.

They found that of the 55 families observed, 40 of the caregivers utilized their mobile devices during the meal. The researchers highlighted a major theme of "absorption" with the mobile devices on the part of the caregivers.

Many caregivers were unresponsive to children's bids for attention and provided instructions and responses to their chargers without looking up from their devices. The notes of these field observations are both incredibly telling and sad. Here is an example describing unresponsiveness on the part of the caregiver:

Female caregiver pulls out her phone from her purse and looks at it. Girl [school age] is talking to her caregiver, caregiver is looking at the phone, nodding a little while the child talks but not looking back at her or responding with words. Caregiver doesn't appear to be listening but says a few words in response every once in a while. Girl asks caregiver about her manicure. Keeps asking her questions but does not appear upset (cheerful facial expression, happy tone of voice) with the few words that caregiver says in response. Caregiver looks around the restaurant. Stares back at her phone. Child sways in her chair and keeps eating fries and asking caregiver questions. Caregiver looks up occasionally to grab a French fry or quickly say something to the girl and then continues to do something on her phone.

Not surprisingly, the researchers also noted that some of the children increased their bids for attention from their caregivers, often by acting out. The researchers also noted that if they parents continued to be "absorbed" in their mobile devices during these instances, they responded particularly harshly to their child's behavior.

Here is a field note describing the escalation of behavioral tactics young children are using when their parents are "absorbed":

Girl [young school aged] comes back to the table, is scratching her head with the fork, looking at her parents [she called them Mom/Dad1. They are looking at their phones. She has a cookie now that her brother gave her. Dad reaches over the table and starts eating the daughter's food. She frowns and says that it is her food. He responds saying, "You aren't eating it, and I bought it, so I'm going to eat it." She shrugs it off and keeps eating her cookie. Dad is scolding boy about something. Both airl and boy look at each other and are smiling. Boy gets up to throw his trash away. He's standing up. Mom is still looking only at her phone, dad is eating, and daughter is drinking from her soda cup. Girl is playing with her noodles with her finger. Dad yells at her to stop. He takes her food away from her and is cleaning up the table. Girl is talking, mostly to the boy. Mom is still looking at her phone. Dad talks to the children to scold them, then goes back to looking around the food court. Mom is still looking at her phone. Dad is looking at her phone with her now. Daughter takes her fork and starts stabbing a container on the table. Mom looks at her and scolds her. Dad keeps telling her to stop, but she continues with a big smile on her face. Mom finally looks up and scolds her. The girl continues what she is doing. The fork snaps, and both parents look up and tell her, "STOP." She laughs, and the boy laughs. ...[later in meal] Mom is showing something to all of them on her phone. Boy is reaching his arm out, and the girl is hitting it, while the girl screams. Dad tells them to stop. Mom is still looking at her phone. Girl gets off of her chair and starts swinging the boy's chair around. Dad tells her to get back in her chair in stern voice. Mom doesn't look up from her phone.

These descriptions are sad, but also not surprising. Many of us have witnessed caregivers or children using phones during times that were previously culturally considered "family times." Often the parents are victims as well, as the advent of e-mail and smart phones has increased expectations that workers will be available and responsive. Gone are the clear-cut boundaries of a dinner out with family, as work, and everyone else, now comes along in our pockets.

#### Persuasive Technology: The Real Issue

Parents are all in this together. There is really only one true opposing side to the issue: persuasive technology and those companies who make money when the rest of us are stressed and distracted. If you find envisioning your child as a teenager as motivation to help you cut down on your mobile phone use, think about what type of behaviors you would want them to exhibit at the dinner table, in the car, and when at restaurants. If you are able to place some restrictions on your digital device, feel confident that doing so is likely good for your relationship with your children.
